

## **Template Reporting**

Template or standardized reporting as compared to free prose reporting is becoming more accepted in medical imaging. It allows a "checklist" mentality to ensure that all the information that the clinician is seeking with imaging is commented on. It also allows straight forward written communication with less ambiguity. Template reporting can prevent the reinterpretation of CT scans when patients are transferred for care, thus saving time and resources. <sup>2,3</sup>
