Women's Heart & Brain Health are at Risk

Gaps in awareness, research, diagnosis and care threaten women's heart and brain health according to a new Heart & Stroke report: <u>System failure:</u> <u>Healthcare inequities continue to leave women's heart and brain health</u> <u>behind</u>.

There is a continued lack of awareness and understanding around women's heart and brain health. Two-thirds of participants in clinical trials on heart disease and stroke have been men and when women are included, an analysis based on sex and gender is not always done. "Transforming the state of women's heart and brain health will involve changing policies, systems, attitudes and behaviours. It will take a massive collaborative effort to break down the barriers that create inequities," says Doug Roth, CEO, Heart & Stroke. (Article sourced from H&S website)



Rehabilitation and Recovery in British Columbia

The 'BC Rehabilitation and Recovery Strategy and Advocacy Plan' is a collaboration between five community organizations, health professionals, and people with lived experience aimed at improving rehabilitation and recovery services for people living with stroke, spinal cord injury, and brain injury in BC. Their Steering Committee, with the input across BC, has put together a set of recommendations aimed at improving the system of post-hospital rehabilitation and support for people living with stroke, spinal cord injury, and brain injury.

What is new in stroke research?

Sleep too little or too much? You may have an increased risk of stroke

Results of a large international study show stroke risk was more than three times higher in those who slept too little, more than twice as high in those who sleep too

much, and two to three times higher in those with symptoms of severe obstructive sleep apnea.

Statin use is associated with lower risk of stroke in patients with atrial <u>fibrillation</u>

Among patients with atrial fibrillation (AF), initiation of statins soon after diagnosis was protective against stroke and related vascular events, and longer duration of use was associated with greater protection, a new cohort study shows.

Cancer risk is elevated after stroke in younger people

Younger people who suffer stroke or intracerebral hemorrhage have about a three- to fivefold increased risk of being diagnosed with cancer in the next few years, new research shows.

An unusual cause of ischemic stroke

The presence of structural bone and cartilage anomalies, which cause mechanical stress to arteries supplying the brain, has been noted to cause stroke in a new case series.
